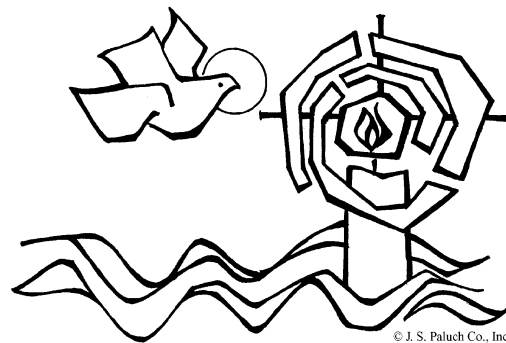

VINCENT'S WORDS

Counseling a group of missionaries who preached throughout rural France, Vincent told them:

When we go on a mission, we do not know where we will stay or exactly what we shall be doing. We will have to adjust to things we never expected, for Providence frequently upsets our plans. Who then does not see that mortification has to be an integral part of the missionary not only in dealings with the poor but also in service to those making a retreat, to seminarians, to convicts and to slaves? Because if we are not mortified, how can we put up with what has to be endured in these different works?

Ponder this question: To what extent has my love of my neighbor stretched me, moved me out of my comfort zone, worked a change in my habits?

Men on average die 6 years earlier than women and live sicker than women. Women are 100% more likely to visit the doctor for preventative care than men. Oppressing the Stranger

The immigration law just passed in Arizona makes the failure to carry immigration documents a crime and gives the police broad power to detain anyone suspected of being in the country illegally. Opponents call the law an open invitation to harass and discriminate against Latinos regardless of their citizenship status. Jim Wallis of *Sojourners Magazine* described the law as “mean-spirited” and a “racial sin.”

Arizona seems to be modeling policy for other states, including our own. On May 4, Pennsylvania state representatives introduced a bill that would allow law enforcement officials “to attempt to verify the status of suspected illegal aliens.”

As a larger, nationwide battle over immigration looms, we remember the words of Exodus 22:21: “You shall not wrong or oppress a stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt.” Let us react not out of fear but out of the love always modeled for us by God.
