Soon we will be asking parishioners to sign a petition to ask Mayor Jim Kenny and Police Chief Richard Ross to change a city policy that harms undocumented immigrants while benefiting a private industry.

NEW SANCTUARY MOVEMENT UPDATE: (Primary Campaign)
The Unmarked Driver's License Campaign for Undocumented Immigrants
The New Sanctuary Movement of Philadelphia is a year into the Driver's
License Campaign. We have allied ourselves with other immigrants' rights
organizations throughout Pennsylvania in the effort to get a new law
passed in the Pennsylvania legislature. A bill was introduced last year and
voting for passage is still a way's off.

## LIVE STOP CAMPAIGN (Secondary Campaign)

Thousands of immigrant residents are denied driver's licenses, but they drive because they have to in order to live.

Following is an example of what happens as a result. Last December an immigrant family (mother, father and three children under ten), associated with the New Sanctuary Movement, was going to a meeting with Mayor Kenney. Their car was pulled over by police at the corner of Kensington and Somerset. The driver was undocumented, meaning he had no license. The police proceeded to apply the Live Stop ordinance. They called for a tow truck to come to impound the car.

The ordinance is based on a Pennsylvania law that requires municipalities to stop people with expired registrations or suspended or revoked licenses and not allow them to drive. Some cities, like Philadelphia, impound the cars.

According to Philadelphia's published procedures regarding Live Stop, the police are directed "to ensure the safety of these occupants (of the car) by offering to either transport the occupants home or to another address if located within a reasonable distance, transporting the individuals to the nearest police district where the occupants can safely make alternate arrangements . . ." <sup>1</sup>

In the aforementioned instance, nothing of the kind occurred. Instead, the family members were left to fend for themselves on the street.

To reclaim an impounded car in Philadelphia is a costly and time consuming proposition. Poor people who are caught driving without a license may even end up losing their car for lack of funds to reclaim it. This ordinance affects more than undocumented immigrants. Over the years since 1998, petitions have been made to the city and suits filed to get Live Stop halted. One legal interpretation of the ordinance is that it is an illegal confiscation of private property. For a fuller treatment of the issue, you may want to read a file on line published by the Center for Social Justice of Temple University.<sup>2</sup>

The New Sanctuary Movement will be meeting with the city officials, particularly Mayor Kenney, to talk about modifying the Live Stop policy in the hope of lessening the impact on immigrant families and other working-class people. As an anti-violence initiative, this program is consistent with Catholic principles of peace and justice. *DignityUSA*, an organization of concerned Catholics, works for respect and justice for all gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender persons in the Catholic Church and throughout the world.

Solidarity Sunday is consistent with the American Bishops' pastoral letter *Always our Children*. Imagine how supported a mother who has been silent about her child's homosexuality would feel, sitting in Church the morning of Solidarity Sunday surrounded by fellow parishioners wearing rainbow ribbons

Concern for the oppressed is part of the very fabric of our Church. One pastor in southern Maine wove the fact that Solidarity Sunday and Pro-Life Sunday occurred on the same day by remarking that the rainbow ribbons were a good reminder of the sanctity of all life. At a Catholic college in Colorado, Solidarity Sunday was celebrated during Parents' Weekend. The Mass included prayers for people who are victims of anti-gay and other kinds of violence, and a ribbon was pinned to the altar cloth during the Offertory.

## How to Participate in Solidarity Sunday

- 1. Wear your Solidarity Sunday ribbon.
- 2. Pray for an end to anti-gay violence
- 3. Educate your children, your faith community, your colleagues, your friends about the need to stop violence against all people, especially gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender people.
- 4. Take the Solidarity pledge.

## The Solidarity Pledge

I WILL WORK for civil and human rights for all people, including gays, lesbians, bisexuals and the transgender. Civil rights are not special rights.

I WILL SEEK to stop jokes and unkind language about anyone, including gays, lesbians, bisexuals and the transgender when spoken in my presence. Words that hurt and bigotry are not funny. I will speak out against any slander, debasement, lies or dehumanization of anyone, including gays, lesbians, bisexuals and the transgender, including when spoken by political or religious leaders. Violent speech leads to physical violence.

I WILL WORK to stop physical violence against anyone, including violence against gays, lesbians, bisexuals or the transgendered. Violence against any person is violence against all people







## Peggy's Eulogy

One of my clearest and fondest memories as a child was painting my nails with whiteout and putting plastic clothing clips on my ears pretending they were earrings at Urban Outfitters while my mother ran the children's department where she was a clothing buyer. I felt like I had the run of the place when I was there and everyone paid me much attention since I was Karen's daughter. I could sense the respect they had for her. I spent a lot of time in the retail world at Urban Outfitter's and one other place where another strong woman I loved worked. That place was Sylvan Pools and that woman was my grandmother Peggy. Peggy, as I'm often going to refer to her as (for this is what we all lovingly called her), would also take me to work with her at Sylvan where she was the Division Manager. She was esteemed in her position and people were drawn to her. I'd play businesswoman in her office, roam the halls talking to her employees and longing for the opportunity to use one of the rafts floating in the pools they were selling on our next trip to the beach.

I loved my days at the office and as I look back I recognize how life shaping they were for me. I learned early on to work hard both professionally and personally. Now that I'm a mom to Jackson and Madison being a working parent and balancing a family resonates so much more. The sacrifices one makes for their children, the sacrifices one makes for their career, the sacrifices one makes for their partner (kids or not).

There is no perfect balance and when work and life gets tough I draw on my memories of Peggy. She worked and loved hard - even when life wasn't always a day at the beach.

I was a frequent visitor with my grandmother to the Jersey Shore an even got to accompany her when I was around 12 on a business trip to Curacao, an island off the coast of Venezuela. Our trips to the beach were wonderful. We'd sing *You Are My Sunshine*, and during rainy trips, *Rain Rain Go Way* until the skies cleared. Along our journeys she'd also share one of her many life lessons and tips with me numbering them as the list of lessons went on. One of the last ones she gave me was, "Life Lesson number 554 – don't get old and if you do, keep you brain and your body sharp!" She was referring to several people she had made friends with where she was living who had Alzheimers." I think often about this statement and take it to heart for I know that I too often take life for granted. Many of us do until faced with a lifechanging event.

We spoke frequently by phone since she was in Seattle and I'm in Massachusetts. There was often a life lesson worked into the conversation and stories and reflections about life and her children and grandchildren who she loved so very, very much and was so proud of.


One of the last messages I received from her was, "You don't have to call me back (she'd always say this), but I just had to call because I got just the most wonderful package yesterday. Those children (referring to her great grandchildren Jackson and Madison who she never got to meet) are so gorgeous and funny, I just adore each picture. Their personalities are priceless and I love the way Madison is always poking at Oliver (she was always mixing up Oliver and Jack, Oliver - Pink loved you so much) - Peg continued - and Jackson is pushing her away with his feet like he's trying to get rid of her. They are characters – and their eyes are beautiful. Madison's are hazel and look just like Cathy's and Jackson's are beautiful and blue like your moms. I'm also recognizing how much they look like John. Someone called out the almond shape of his eyes to me. Is he Asian at all? Have you looked into his background – I think they could be right... If not, you should it would be nice to have someone interesting in the family...and on she went for another couple of minutes." For those of you who know John he's Scottish and for those who knew Peg well, she could go one for hours on topics like this if allowed. Unfortunately (or fortunately depending on the day) voicemail only has a three-minute limit.

If she could speak to me right now she might say, okay Jenna life lesson number 555, "keep things moving and throw in something else kind of funny to keep the mood light". Since I'm not great with jokes I'll share a funny memory from our trip to Curacao. We were walking in one of the small towns just after lunch and took a stroll to the beach. It had pristine white sand, clear blue water, tall palm trees and lots of people without bathing

suits. Peggy and her co-workers gasped and hurried to cover my eyes and escort me as quickly off the beach as possible. Little did they know that the beach at our hotel also had this "optional" policy. Every afternoon while they were at business meetings I would hang out with the my new friends - a gaggle of woman in their 60s who liked a little extra sun.

For me life with Peggy was filled with adventure, but most importantly love, wisdom and support. Through her I fell in love with the Theatre. We saw everything from Cats, to Phantom of the Opera to Rent. She even helped enroll me at the Walnut Street Theater school when I was a young girl coaching me on my audition song, Memory. She did the same for me when I applied to Emerson College for a coveted spot in the theatre program. She travelled from Philly to Boston to watch me do obscure monologues and even supported me when I chose to go abroad to study theatre and pretend to be a cat for an entire semester (I gave up acting that year).

Peggy was a rock in my life, a second mother, a mentor, a confident and a role model. I wish my Jackson and Madison could experience the love she had for them first hand, but I know she is with them and us all in some way, and I am comforted to see the love Jack and Maddy have for my mom and dad and the love they have for them in return. I too had this relationship with Peggy, as did my sister Julia and brother Matt, and it's a bond that will last longer than we walk here on earth. Peggy you are deeply missed, but I feel you everyday and give kisses to Jack and Maddy on their neck for you as you always lovingly asked.
