THE STAR OF BETHLEHEM

The unfolding of the story of the Incarnation continues today as the Church celebrates the Epiphany. The tale of the magi from the East is one of the most fascinating in all of scripture. It has much to teach us about what we can come to expect, even in circumstances and places that may seem insignificant or small. Bethlehem was a tiny town. Yet it is over this seemingly insignificant place that the guiding star stops in its own search for the place where the Savior would be born. Too often we fail to recognize the fact that the star of Bethlehem comes to rest in our everyday lives, where we can experience God's presence, manifested in ever new ways.

POWER UPDATE

Come celebrate MLK Day (**Monday, January 16**) at a city-wide march convening at 12 noon at Mother Bethel AME Church (6th & Lombard Sts), a church that symbolizes the continual re-commitment to justice we are called to make, and pass along to our children. Watch for more details in early January.

POWER will also sponsor a series of trainings for the serious work we need to do in 2017 and beyond. The first training will be on Sun Jan 15 (MLK's actual birthday), 5 to 8 PM at 2nd Baptist Church of Germantown. This will be dedicated to Non-Violent Direct Action, in the spirit of MLK's own work. There will be a break-out group just for young people (high school age). This march is sponsored by a coalition of organizations including POWER, of which St Vincent's is a member.

POWER/ Philadelphians Organized to Witness, Empower & Rebuild is a interfaith coalition of 50+ congregations in the city and suburbs working together to change policies that exclude and harm people of color, people of low income, and immigrants in our communities! We work to increase the minimum wage, improve public school funding, and reform criminal justice practices. RECONCILIATION UNITY MINISTRY INVITATION

RUM members commit to meeting together monthly, and following up on "homework" that arises between meetings, to talk, plan or collaborate with members of other ministries or external groups about ideas raised in RUM. And we have a one-day retreat coming up on **Saturday, January 14** for all old and new RUM members, so save that date!

The mission of the Reconciliation & Unity Ministry (RUM) is to foster our "becoming One Body of Christ" as a parish community where all are welcome - across races, generations, sexual orientations, countries of origin, and Mass preferences - to encounter Christ's loving presence in each other.

RUM began in the aftermath of the national trauma generated by the death of Michael Brown in Ferguson in 2014, when Fr Sy invited a diverse group of parishioners to come together to reflect on what our times called us to be and do as a parish community. In its first two years, RUM initiated the Pew Conversations to encourage dialogue among parishioners about the meaning of the Gospel for our lives. RUM also launched Movie Nights, bringing us together to think about pressing and potentially divisive issues like racism, homophobia, and immigration. RUM's main purpose is not to start new programs but to encourage our many ministries - from liturgy to social justice - to use "becoming One" as a central guide for their work.

Preparing the Way for National Migration Week (January 8th to 14th, 2017) #4

Migrants and refugees are not pawns on the chessboard of humanity. They are children, women and men who leave or who are forced to leave their homes for various reasons, who share a legitimate desire for knowing and having, but above all for being more.

Pope Francis

"Migrants and Refugees: Towards a Better World," 2014

In the last three inserts in the Bulletin you have read Pope Francis' letter to us on immigrant and refugee children. The Church in the United States has a rich history of caring for immigrants and refugees at the grass roots level. In key moments, the U.S. bishops have also spoken prophetically on the issue. For many years, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has considered immigration a key pastoral concern of the Church in this vast nation. Its Migration and Refugee Services Office includes a program boldly titled "Justice for Immigrants." The program's website explains:

Why does the Church care about immigration policies?

The Catholic Church has historically held a strong interest in immigration and how public policy affects immigrants seeking a new life in the United States. Based on Scriptural and Catholic social teachings, as well as her own experience as an immigrant Church in the United States, the Catholic Church is compelled to raise her voice on behalf of those who are marginalized and whose God-given rights are not respected.

The Church believes that current immigration laws and policies have often led to the undermining of immigrants' human dignity and have kept families apart. The existing immigration system has resulted in a growing number of persons in this country in an unauthorized capacity, living in the shadows as they toil in jobs that would otherwise go unfilled. Close family members of

U.S. citizens and lawful permanent residents must wait years for a visa to be reunited. And, our nation's border enforcement strategies have been ineffective and have led to the death of thousands of migrants.

Two years ago, Bishop Eusebio Elizondo, Chairman of the USCCB Committee on Migration, wrote to Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security Jeh Johnson opposing the detention of families because "it is inhumane to house young mothers with children in restrictive detention facilities as if they are criminals." But detention continues very near us in the Berks Detention Center that houses twenty Central American women and their children who seek asylum. In their efforts to be released, these women have undertaken two hunger strikes, to no avail. Bishop Elizondo considers this kind of detention a violation of human rights.

We end with the last two paragraphs of a Christmas letter that Cardinal Daniel DiNardo, head of the USCBC, issued last week:

We discover the fragile innocence of hope in the eyes of a newborn baby, wrapped in swaddling clothes. Mary and Joseph welcomed this young hope, for Jesus made known, in his very Person, the promise of "great joy that will be for all people." We can nurture that same hope today. We do this by greeting one another in love and charity, embracing civility and not letting our differences hide the dignity and beauty God has given each of us as his children.

Allow me to say a special word to our sisters and brothers who find themselves immigrants and refugees on Christmas Day. In you, we see the very struggles of the Holy Family. From the angel of the Lord, Joseph heard the call to "rise and flee" in order to keep Mary and Jesus safe from violence at home. The Catholic Church in the United States is praying for you and is working to welcome you as we would the Holy Family.

Merciful God our Father:

As Yahweh you asked your chosen people to take care of the widow, the orphan, and the stranger, defining our responsibility to those who are unprotected by family or community.

Through your own son Jesus Christ you taught us the value of stretching the definition of who belongs to your people.

In the revelation of your love for us, you gave us the great command of loving each other and becoming mirrors of your love.

Grant that in this time of concentrated awareness of the plight of immigrants and refugees in our midst we may open our hearts to embrace them, to stand with them, to proclaim our common humanity with them, and to support new policies that welcome them, as we decry those practices that harm them and harm our own society. Grant that, as we join the struggle for the dignity of undocumented immigrants, we also remain engaged in opposing the discrimination, violence, poverty, incarceration, and the death penalty that many people have suffered in this country.

We appeal to your mercy to keep this parish united and faithful under your loving gaze. Amen.




