HAPPY EASTER & PASSOVER, CHRISTIANS & JEWS!

The major feasts in Christianity and Judaism are always celebrated in the spring, usually close together. This year, the 8day Passover festival begins on the evening of April 10, while Palm Sunday launches us into Holy Week on April 9, culminating in Easter on Apr 16. Our two faith-communities share beautiful scriptures and the same God who creates and sus-tains us. But we also have a history of tension and oppression over the centuries, where Christians have allowed a partial or warped understanding of our faith and our scriptures to open us up to anti-Jewish thoughts, words and actions, including blaming all Jews for the death of Jesus. This sadly paved the way for far too many Christians to stand by as the Holocaust took place, and it remains a blind-spot for many. In this Lenten season, let us pray for the courage, as Catholics, to repent for the "sins of omission" that keep the seeds of anti-Semitism alive in our hearts and our communities. And let us give thanks that as Jews and Christians, we are truly sisters and brothers in God's love. For more food for thought on this topic, pick up one of a reading (on purple paper) on the tables near the church entrance. CONTEXT

Lack of rain has devastated the lives and stability of millions of families. Grazing is becoming scarce, rivers are drying up and livestock—a valuable asset—is wasting away. With higher food costs and loss of family income, a hunger crisis is growing. The governments of Kenya and Somalia have each declared a national emergency.

The humanitarian situation in Somalia has deteriorated rapidly. According to the United Nations, a massive scale-up of humanitarian assistance is urgently needed in the coming weeks to avoid famine in the most-affected areas. The number of people in need has increased to 6.2 million, or half of the population. As many as 363,000 children under age 5 are acutely malnourished, and 71,000 are at risk of dying. Nutrition support is critical to keep them alive.

Drought has also heavily hit neighboring Kenya's arid and semi-arid lands-home to 30 percent of the population, or 14 million people. Most of the country's national parks-the foundation of a thriving wildlife tourism sector-are also in these regions. This area of Kenya-the least developed—has limited services and poor infrastructure, leaving communities especially vulnerable to drought. The water level of boreholes and shallow wells is low, and pastoralists are migrating in search of water and pasture for their livestock. Also, growing demand for water, and overpumping at community boreholes, has led to more pump breakdowns. People are resorting to desperate tactics: skipping one or more meals daily, migrating to look for work, and selling deteriorating livestock at low prices to buy food. An estimated 2.7 million people need emergency relief.

CRS RESPONSE

CRS is providing comprehensive, lifesaving relief to 18,000 drought-affected pastoralist families, or more than 100,000 people, so they can access water and strengthen their livestock assets—a key link to their nutrition and livelihoods. CRS is able to reach people in need and scale up our response in especially vulnerable areas in Somalia and Kenya thanks to our local Catholic partners. Emergency relief and recovery activities include the following:

ACCESS TO WATER

- Rehabilitating shallow wells and boreholes. This includes water points that have failed, as well as newly drilled underground water sources that remain undeveloped because of funding constraints.
- Installing additional water points, making them more accessible to reduce lines for water and improve drainage.
- Employing residents to maintain dams, providing their households and the local economy with cash while preparing local water infrastructure for future rains.
- Supporting the creation of county borehole maintenance teams to respond to pump breakdowns with the proper tools and better pumps, and helping local officials recruit more pump mechanics and electricians.
- Helping communities prepare for rainwater harvesting during October rains by repairing and rehabilitating surface water points.
- Providing emergency cash grants or vouchers to families to help them meet their nutritional and water needs.

SUPPORT FOR LIVESTOCK

- Making water for livestock more available by adding designated animal watering points near those for people.
- Supplying high-quality supplementary livestock feed to communities where it is scarce.


 Using animals left behind by migrating families to provide food, including milk for children.

LIVESTOCK PRODUCTION AND LIVELIHOODS

- Helping families secure veterinary services and fodder for vulnerable livestock, especially those that women-headed households rely on for food and income.
- Providing small livestock, allowing families that lost animals to rebound.
- Facilitating disease control and prevention through vaccination and deworming, and collaborating with the government to survey disease and migration patterns,
- Educating community members on health care for livestock.

SOUTH SUDAN FAMINE

Famine has been declared in three counties in Unity State, and a hunger crisis is affecting nearly 5 million people. CRS is providing food aid to some 800,000 people in Jonglei State. CRS provides food in exchange for work on building community infrastructure, and provides it directly when violence prevents such work. In partnership with the U.N. World Food Program, CRS airdrops food supplies into areas that are difficult to reach.




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

FROM VIA CRUCIS TO VIA LUCIS

In December of 2001 the Holy See issued a *Directory on Popular Piety and the Liturgy*. In that document, the devotional practice known as the *Via Lucis* (the Way of Light) was noted.

In imitation of the Way of the Cross (*Via Crucis*), the stations of the Way of Light (*Via Lucis*) are based on the Resurrection appearances of Jesus. Though not as well-established or defined as the *Via Crucis*, this *Via Lucis* is a prayerful way to celebrate the joy, hope, and power of the Resurrection. Here are some "stations" to get you started. You may want to add your own favorite Gospel resurrection stories.

The finding of the empty tomb. "But when the women looked up, they saw that the very large stone at the door of the tomb, had been rolled away." (Mark 16:4)

Prayer: Risen Lord, may I have the faith to find you in hollow and surprising places.

Mary Magdalene meets the risen Jesus. Jesus looked at her and said, "Mary." She turned and cried out in a loud voice, "Rabboni!" ("Teacher!"). (John 20:16)

Prayer: Risen Lord, I listen for your voice calling me by name; look on me in mercy.

Jesus appears on the road to Emmaus The two disciples urged Jesus, "Stay here with us, evening draws near; the day is almost over." So Jesus went in, and stayed with them. (Luke 24:29)

Prayer: Risen Lord, stay with me through every day, as I follow you steadfastly.

Jesus strengthens the faith of Thomas. Jesus said to Thomas, "Put your fingers here; see my hands—reach out your own hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt, but believe." (John 20:26)

Prayer: Risen Lord, let me face my doubts as Thomas did; increase my belief.

Jesus commissions his followers. Jesus said: "Go, make disciples of the nations. Baptize them in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit." (Matthew 28:19)

Prayer: Risen Lord, help me obey your command to be a strong and faithful messenger.

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BEYOND THE JUBILEE YEAR

Although the official observance of the Jubilee year of mercy is past, all of Christian life hinges on the practice of mercy. This Easter season, here are some concrete ways to do so.

• Week One: Give drink to the thirsty.

In your own life, be intentional about water usage; look for ways to reduce waste and become aware of the gift we often take for granted. Donate to an organization that helps provide safe drinking water to the developing world, such as the Water Project, Catholic Relief Services, or Heifer International.

• Week Two: Bury the dead.

If your parish is hosting a funeral this week, help pray that soul into Heaven. Can you offer up an early lunch hour to volunteer as a lector, sacristan, or extraordinary minister of communion? Help prepare a meal for the bereaved?

• Week Three: Visit the sick.

No one wants to expose themselves to sickness. But those experiencing illness have great need for support from their communities. Who in your school, parish or neighborhood is overwhelmed by the illness, whether major or seasonal, of a family member? Can you mow their lawn? Bring them dinner? Run errands they can't do themselves? Chauffeur children to activities?

• Week Four: Visit the imprisoned.

Those involved in prison ministry can attest to how fulfilling it can be. If this is too far outside your comfort zone, perhaps you can become pen pals with an inmate. Sites like friendsbeyondthewall.com and writeaprisoner.com allow you to send messages electronically or via post.

• Week Five: Counsel the doubtful.


Most of us experience too much doubt ourselves to feel equal to this work of mercy. This week, read a book about the faith and shore up your own, so you can help another when the need arises.

• Week Six: Pray for the living and the dead.

It's easy to get sidetracked by the phone, the kids, the dirty dishes, or the song on the earbuds. This week, make a physical list of all the people you know who have asked for prayers. Devote five minutes a day to quiet, undistracted prayer.

• Week Seven: Admonish sinners

This week, before engaging in "admonishment," take a few moments to try to understand the other person's experiences, and how they got there. When things must be said, focus on actions, and frame your words with kindness, understanding, and lack of judgment.



In the time between Easter and the Ascension, Jesus appeared to his disciples in the burial garden, in closed rooms, and by lake shores. It's tempting to view those stories as mere throwbacks to Scriptural times. It was easier for them, we tell ourselves; they actually saw Jesus himself.

We often forget that more than once, the disciples failed to recognize Jesus until his actions revealed his divinity. Why was that? Were their minds clouded? Or is it possible that he wore a different face than the man they had known? Maybe, just maybe, it was as difficult for them to recognize the face of Jesus as it is for us today.

Modern life keeps us in motion and constantly stimulated. The irony is that with so much to see, we miss a lot. We avoid eye contact with people holding signs at street corners; we avoid eye contact with people who exhibit signs of disability or mental illness; we avoid eye contact with people going through tough times, because we don't know what to say or we don't want to get involved.

Eye contact invites communication, and communication leads to relationship. However fleeting, we are, in that moment, responsible for honoring the dignity of another person. We are compelled to act, but we don't know how we can take on another burden when we're already so heavy-laden that we feel we're treading water. We're afraid the weight of one more thing will pull us under.

Jesus Christ is still appearing in our world, every day, every moment. But if we do not consciously seek his face among those we encounter, we run the risk of not recognizing him at all.

AN EASTER LETTER FROM ST. BERNADETTE

My dear brothers and sisters:

You may know my name because it is tied to one of the great feasts of the Church year. But I beg you to remember that the woman you honor as St. Bernadette was the humblest of God's creatures. My family was so poor, all seven of us lived in a single basement room that had once been a jail. At the time my adventure began, I couldn't even read or write. In fact, I had not even received my first Communion, because my teachers thought I was too dim-witted to learn what was necessary.

To put it simply, I was not a likely candidate to become a visionary.

That day when I was fourteen, I went out to gather firewood near the cave called Massabielle, which was sometimes used as a garbage dump for the people of our town. I fell behind my companions, and I heard the sound of rushing wind, but nothing was moving—except a wild rose in a dark corner of the grotto. It was my first glimpse of the white-clad lady who eventually called herself the Immaculate Conception.

My companions saw nothing. As the visions continued, I became a point of division in our town. Some thought I was lying; others, that I belonged in an asylum. Police and clergy questioned me, certain it was all a hoax. Yet sick people began visiting the spring she had shown me. Many were cured.

May God give you the courage to allow divine work to be done through you.

To Christ be all glory forever, Bernadette Soubirous

St. Bernadette contracted cholera as a toddler and suffered from asthma for the rest of her life. By the time the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception at Massabielle was dedicated in 1876, her health was too poor to allow her to attend. She died in 1879 at the age of thirty-five and was canonized in 1933. Her feast day is April 16.
