Last-minute call to join St Vincent's and people of faith from across our city and state for a prayerful and prophetic day of action to speak out on the inequity in schoold funding! This will be a great family field trip for you and your kids/ grand-kids the day after school's out - educational and inspiring to see "democracy in action" in one of the most beautiful and historic Capitol buildings in the nation. Food and bus service (from St Malachy's) provided free by POWER. Carpool from St Vincent's at 7:30am; buses leave St Malachy's at 8:30, back at St V's by 6pm.

Here's why your presence matters: Research by POWER and the Education Law Center shows that on average, majority-white school districts receive \$2000 more per child from the state than majority-African American or Latino districts—across the state, not just in SE PA. No matter whether your children attended public, charter, or private schools, we can stand together for the right of ALL Pennsylvania children to a fairly-funded, high-quality education!

POWER is assisting New Sanctuary Movement in gathering stories about the devastating financial impact of this practice, in an effort to convince city officials that it is just as safe - and far less costly - to grant drivers 30 minutes to get a licensed friend to drive the car to a home location rather than to a PPA lot. 

This was the first of two sold-out, back-to back benefits for the church located at 1350 E. Vernon Road. The Men of St. Raymond held a jazz night in the school hall recently. The following afternoon the church hosted "An Evening of Mahalia Jackson" featuring singer Joilet Harris in the sanctuary.

The Rev. Christopher M. Walsh, pastor of St. Raymond's, was pleased with the overwhelming response for the events. Together they raised thousands of dollars for the church ministries. "The parish is most grateful to all those who have worked so generously to raise funds for our hall renovation recently," Walsh said. "Mary Jones and Pat Brockington along with a very large crew of helpers raised more than \$1,400 with their Good Friday fish fry. Joanne Evans, along with her very able team, raised more than \$3,500 through the Mahalia Jackson tribute concert."

The men's ministry raised even more money from the jazz event. Otis Wilson said that they reached their goal of at least \$1,000. He said that the monies will be used for some needed upgrades at the school that serves children in the surrounding community from kindergarten to eighth grade. 



Black Lives Matter at St. Vincent's

I bring myself, my Black self, all that I am, all that I have, all that I hope to become. I bring my whole history, my tradition, my experience, my culture...."

At St. Vincent's Parish, our support for Black Lives Matter is rooted in our deep Catholic understanding of the fundamental dignity of all life and our understanding that God is *always on the side of justice for the oppressed* in the human story (Matthew 25:35-40).

A multi-racial group led by some of our black parishioners has been meeting for months to study Black Lives Matter and discern a way forward for discussion and the possible creation and display of a parish banner as a communal demonstration of support.

The origins of Black Lives Matter is described in the following excerpt found on the Black Lives Matter website:

"#BlackLivesMatter-was created in 2012 by three women of African descent, two of whom are queer identified. After the murder of Trayvon Martin, Trayvon's killer, George Zimmerman, was acquitted for his crime, and the dead 17-year old was posthumously placed on trial for his own murder. Rooted in the experiences of Black people in this country who actively resist our dehumanization, #BlackLivesMatter is a call to action and a response to the virulent anti-Black racism that permeates our society. Black Lives Matter is a unique contribution that goes beyond extrajudicial killings of Black people by police and vigilantes."

(Paraphrased from the blacklivesmatter.com/herstory/)

#BlackLivesMatter is working for a world where Black lives are no longer systematically and intentionally targeted for demise. Black Lives Matter affirms the humanity, resilience in the face of deadly oppression, and innumerable contributions of black folks to this society. It recognizes and celebrates the sweat equity and love for Black people now put into creating a political project—"taking the hashtag off of social media and into the streets. The call for Black lives to matter is a rallying cry for ALL Black lives striving for liberation."

Black Lives Matter is committed to:

Collectively, lovingly and courageously working vigorously for freedom and justice for Black people and, by extension all people.

· intentionally building and nurturing a beloved community that is bonded together through a beautiful struggle that is restorative, not depleting.

- acknowledging, respecting and celebrating difference(s) and commonalities.
- · embodying and practicing justice, liberation, and peace in engagements with one another.
- practicing empathy

While we at St. Vincent's recognize the intersection of multiple forms of oppression, the statement "Black Lives Matter" follows the long legacy of Black liberation movements that has always ultimately supported and benefitted the liberation movements of all oppressed people.

"Black Lives Matter at St. Vincent's", therefore, is a statement of love for Black folks. It is a challenge to us all to live the love we proclaim as we build relationships across race and heal America's historical narrative. As Catholics of all ethnicities, "Black Live Matters at St. Vincent" also calls us to recognize the historic role of our **Catholic Church** in creating and maintaining systems of racial injustice-**even** as we have continued to work against oppression. This work will require us to struggle together across a difficult terrain but to do so trusting God and holding on to one another in hope.

During this Resurrection season, we are challenged to make closer connections across race, gender and age and sexual orientation. We are mindful that we have all been affected, particularly white folks, by the participation in unjust systems since the beginning of our nation, which have made us all blind to the ways we help sustain them. St. Vincent's Black Lives Matter study group invites you to our upcoming reflections and community conversations to be announced this Easter and Pentecost season. Is God calling you to help move the stone of racism in our church and world, this Easter season? For more information please see below.



Our Spring issue of *Voices From Prison and the Edge* is devoted to the reality that our American society criminalizes mental illness. "People are not officially incarcerated because of psychiatric ailments, but that's the unintended effect," writes Nicholas Kristoff in an article on this topic in the New York Times, (February 2017). Statistics below are from this article.

"Psychiatric disorders are the only kind of sickness that we as a society regularly respond to not with sympathy but with handcuffs and incarceration. And as more humane and cost-effective ways of treating mental illness have been cut back, we increasingly resort to the law-enforcement toolbox: jails and prisons. "More than half of prisoners in the United States have a mental health problem, according to a 2006 Justice Department study. Among female inmates, almost three-quarters have a mental disorder. In jail (in Cook County, Chicago), some prisoners sit on their beds all day long, lost in their delusions, oblivious to their surroundings, hearing voices, sometimes talking back to them. The first person to say that this system is barbaric is their jailer." ...OR A

FELLOW INMATE!--one who notices the humanity of the person and responds in kind. We received the following letter from an inmate-- call him "Johnny"-- that poignantly illustrates the issue of mental illness in prison and how a person's compassion is the best medicine:


Fr. Paul, I'm sorry for the delay in my responses to your letters. I've been in and out of the hole and out of my mind! I'm trying to have a sense of humor about it, but it's really not funny. I just got 150 days in DTU (Mental Health Hole). It's a long story but the gist of it is this: a C.O. (Corrections Officer) made something up on a bogus misconduct for something I didn't do, just to get me out of the way. I was unaware of this until the team was at my door telling me to pack. "You're going to the hole." I snapped, got hit with a 10% grade OC spray, and given a black eye. This happened in November. I've been a little stressed out, but I'm doing a little better. I get a little peace of mind locked in this cell by myself. The C.O.s and inmates can't bother me and I have my tablet, so the music helps a lot. I also made friends with another inmate. "Derek" is 27, a little slow and has severe mental help problems. Everyone treated him bad because he was acting crazy. He doesn't have any electronics and can't read or write. When he snaps (even I have never seen this happen before), he rips out desks bolted to the floor, beats the door, and tears light fixtures clean out. He usually does this when he quits taking his meds, which is often. He's three cells away from me and in another program. I'm the only MHU (Mental Health Unit) on this tier. I was put here originally as MHU overflow and I was supposed to get moved. To make a long story short, the kid just wanted someone to listen to him and he's not that crazy (just a little bit). I got him to take his meds for three weeks now and told him how pleasurable he is to talk to on his meds. I told him that with meds he's normal, a human being, even if others still treat him like an animal. A few data snapshots that illustrate the problem: (from the Kristoff article)

Nationwide in America, more than three times as many mentally ill people are housed in prisons and jails as in hospitals, <u>according to a 2010 study</u> by the <u>National Sheriffs' Association</u> and the <u>Treatment Advocacy Center</u>.

"Taxpayers spend as much as \$300 or \$400 a day supporting patients with psychiatric disorders while they are in jail, partly because the mentally ill require medication and extra supervision and care. "Finally, this is the stupidest thing I've seen government do," Thomas Dart, the Sheriff of the Cook County Jail in Chicago says, "It would be far cheaper," he adds, "to manage the mentally ill with a case worker on the outside than to spend such sums incarcerating them."

In 1955, there was one bed in a psychiatric ward for every 300 Americans: now there is one bed for every 3,000 Americans, the 2010 study said. So while more effective pharmacological treatments are theoretically available, they are often very difficult to access for people who are only borderline functional. "Some people come here to get medication," says Ardell Hall, a superintendent of a woman's unit at the jail. "They commit a crime to get in."

Listen as Johnny continues his story about relating to Derek in the Mental Health Unit in a Pennsylvania prison:



He likes country music so I blast music, running my tablet through a broken desktop radio. Well even the COs saw a difference in Derek. They started to give him extra food and so forth. When the Lieutenant went to move me to the MHU tier, Derek yelled out "Don't move my boy! He talks to me. Please! I've been doing good." (This was so sad but it brought a smile to my face). I never hesitate, 24 hours a day, to answer when Derek calls my name. Even if I am asleep, he's not a headache...I like him. The staff sees the change and knows I can work with him when even they can't. Many CO's and two psyches have thanked me. The Lieutenant says, "Well I don't want to be the one that causes you to get 41 more years." He was smiling as he ripped my MHU door tag off and walked away. I'm still

MHU, but I remain here. I go to group and yard with MHU and they think I'm crazy now. Good!

This brings to mind a Gospel story, Jesus' intervention with a "possessed" boy (Mk 9:14). When the boy's father brought him to Jesus, it says that the boy fell to the ground in convulsions, foaming at the mouth. Very scary! Jesus' reaction—compassion instead of fear and "locking them up like animals"—is an example for us. We notice this compassion in how Johnny treats Derek almost like his son—at the

expense of being considered crazy himself. Is this what Jesus has done, become 'crazy with us,' at least considered crazy and dangerous for "casting out demons"? The next time you see a mentally ill person, think of Jesus. Finally, Johnny concludes with a profound image of Mary in the prison cell with him. Surely it is something to ponder ourselves, no matter what addictions, family troubles, emotional illnesses or loneliness afflicts us in our daily lives:

They cuff me like an animal. Lock me up like an animal, and I am lonely. Sometimes I look at the Mary Mother of Captives picture you gave me. Depending on my state of mind I use it as a reminder that the Blessed Mother is in the cell with me too. Her back to the locked gate, she's holding the fetters that bind me because she wants me to be free, if only in the cell with her.



She knows who I am and not what the courts or prison officials say I am. She sees past the violence and the

chaos I am capable of causing. She sees into my heart at the pain inside. And she holds what binds me to her own heart. I am hanging in there, struggling like hell, still doubtful, but I promise I won't give up hope. Love is paid by love alone. — Johnny.

In conclusion, Mary knows who we are too. She holds the fetters that bind us because she wants us to be free too, if only in the cell with her. She sees into our hearts at the pain inside. And she binds us to her own heart. Pray for Johnny, Derek and their families. Pray—and make your voice heard—for our country too as we make decisions about mental health care and criminal justice. Demand compassion! Have Blessed Spring, Fr. Paul, George Munyan and the Adeodatus Team.

Saints in Prison St. John Stone O.S.A.

Most see all prisoners as outlaws, people outside of the law. They are the guilty ones. But who will speak for the innocent, living and dying in prison? John Stone probably looked like any prisoner as he staggered by in chains on the way to Dungeon Hill. His story presents us with a question. Are we guilty if we break an unjust law, or is society guilty for creating the unjust law?

John Stone was an Augustinian monk living at Canterbury, England in the 16th century. He publicly denounced the behavior of King Henry VIII for divorcing his wife, marrying another, and declaring himself head of the Church of England. A law was passed, the Treasons Act, which declared all as criminals who did not accept the King, rather than the Pope, as the head of the church in England. The punishment was prison, torture and death, if you did not accept the king as head of the church. All bishops, priests and religious were required to obey this law. The Bishop of Dover, who had renounced the Pope, visited Canterbury to close the Augustinian friary as ordered by King Henry VIII. The Bishop ordered all of the monks to sign the document declaring the King as head of the church.

John Stone refused to sign and was imprisoned in the Tower of London. In 1539 he was sent back to Canterbury, and tried under the Treasons Act. Found guilty, he was sentenced to death. Before his execution on Dungeon Hill, Stone said: "I close my apostolate in my blood. In my death I shall find life, for I die for a holy cause, the defense of the Church of God, infallible and immaculate". John Stone was hanged to near death, briefly revived in order to feel his disembowelment, and finally, his limbs were severed. To further dishonor his corpse as a traitor, his head and body were left displayed, unburied as a reminder to all, the need to obey the king. Instead St. John Stone obeyed his conscience and was willing to die for it.

One doesn't need to be a martyr for faith to be unjustly imprisoned.

The Innocence Project is a witness to this. A record-breaking number of people were exonerated in 2015 — freed after serving time in American prisons for crimes they did not commit. In all, 149 people spent an average of 15 years in prison before being cleared last year, according to a new report from the National Registry of Exonerations, a project at the University of Michigan Law School. The convictions ranged from lower level offenses, such as 47 drug crimes, to major felonies, including 54 murder convictions that were overturned. Five of the convicts were awaiting execution, and were saved last year when courts ruled they didn't belong in the prison in the first place.



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We are Adeodatus, a support group for ex-inmates, for those struggling with addictions, and anyone who cares about their reintegration into society. We meet every Thursday night (7:30 to 9:00 P.M.) Through prayer, the Gospel and Christian fellowship we offer strength to meet the challenges of life in this world.



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
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
