A New Sanctuary in Germantown

What do we understand by Sanctuary in the midst of the Trump administration, the most anti-immigrant presidential administration ever? The dictionary gives us refuge, haven, harbor, shelter, retreat, hideaway, hideout. True. But Sanctuary is much more. "Sanctus" means simply holy. The space where the Holy resides is sacred. This is the meaning that we hold onto as we ask the Lord to be with the two families that officially started their lives in Sanctuary in the First United Methodist Church of Germantown (FUMCOG) on Wednesday this past September 5th.

We proclaimed Sanctuary! As if entering a sacramental relationship, the parents of the two families asked the congregation to be received with some of their children in a sacred space, and to be supported in their determination to remain in the United States as a whole, united family. We in turn opened our hearts to each of them.

The Families

Suyapa Reyes, from the town of Tocoa, near the Caribbean Sea in Honduras, fled violence four years ago. She entered Sanctuary with her daughters Jennifer (13) and Yeimi (7), and her sons Jeison (3) and Josué (9 mos.).

Oneita and Clive Thompson left their island country of Jamaica because of gang violence and have been in this country for fifteen years. They entered Sanctuary with Christine (15) and Timothy (13).

Both families have deportation orders, as they have been denied asylum by immigration authorities.

The Sanctuary Proclamation

After songs and a statement by FUMCOG's pastor, the immigrant families spoke:

"Whether we are here for two days or two years, we are ready to fight to keep our family together. We cannot understand laws that would take us away from our children. We believe in God and know that we will win," said Oneita and Clive Thompson.

"I will do whatever it takes to keep my children with me and provide a better future for them," said Suyapa Reyes.

At that point everyone entered the temple. FUMCOG's Pastor Bob Coombe reminded everyone that in 1984 this very space had received the family of a Guatemalan labor organizer in Sanctuary, after they fled persecution and war. They all eventually became citizens. He said *Sanctuary* is not a noun, but a *verb*. The community *does* Sanctuary. We together become Sanctuary for each other. We pledge ourselves to each other's security and wellbeing. Moreover, Reverend Coombe stated that the Sanctuary community is Germantown, not only one Methodist congregation.

Rabbi Linda Holtzman, from Tikkun Olam Chavurah, stressed the act of love that is involved in welcoming two families into our own community. She connected this action with the month of Elul and the Jewish High Holidays, when we are invited to enter a new time and leave our old sins and shortcomings in the past. The month of Elul makes a reference, in the very

letters of its name, to a statement from Solomon's Song in the Scriptures: "I am my Beloved and my Beloved is Mine." This absolute surrender opens the human heart to a new time. This is why people throw breadcrumbs to a creek or a lake during the "Days of Awe" or "Days of Repentance": not only to feed the geese, she said, but to represent the casting off of burdens in us. Our proclamation of Sanctuary is like that: entering into a new time in freedom and love.

Mishkan Shalom's Rabbi Shawn Zevit said that to welcome the Thompson and Reyes families fully into our community was precisely the work of this time of the year (High Holidays) among Jewish people of faith. He reflected on the meaning of the words Jew, Israelite and Hebrew. The word "Jew" is derived from "Yehudi," which means not only a member of the tribe of Judah, but also "one who rejects idolatry." To proclaim Sanctuary is to reject the idolatry of bad laws and policies and to sanctify the name of the Holy One above all else. The name "Israel" means "the one who struggles with the Lord." It was given to Jacob, son of Isaac, after he fought with an angel. The people of God were called *Israelites* especially since Exodus, the time when in order to recover their freedom and land, they were forced to traverse the desert and become a wandering people without a home. Just like the people who arrive at the border and hope for a better life in the United States. Finally, the word "Hebrew" comes from "Ivrim," or "the one who crossed over," like Abraham, who followed the Lord's command to leave his father's home and find a new and foreign land where he would make his home.

Reverend Coombe showed the assembly a bundle of twigs tied with string. He said it had been by the altar for a long time. Joel Morales, the first recipient of Sanctuary at this temple, had told the congregation that one twig was easy to break in two, but a bundle was not. After this, everyone was invited to take a twig and place it in a large bowl, where it could be made into a very large bundle.

Rabbi Zevit finds the proximity of the Jewish High Holidays a perfect time for the beginning of a Sanctuary commitment to the two families, to whom he offered a blessing, extended to the whole community. And with this, the Sanctuary was formally begun.

What Can Saint Vincent's Do?

When Rev. Coombe, a friend of our church, declares that this is a Germantown Sanctuary, he means to involve a parish like ours in the care of these families. FUMCOG and the New Sanctuary Movement are looking for support in the form of donations, visits to the families, occasionally driving the children to or from school, and signing a letter asking ICE to stop their deportation. They need us!

We are inviting you to a meeting. Choose the time that suits your schedule. Please come! Please be/do/become Sanctuary with us! The meeting date options are:

- Wednesday, October 10, 2018, 7:00 p.m. in the St. Vincent hospitality room
- Sunday, October 14, 2018 after the 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. Masses

1- Complete a paper form and postmark/ mail it to your County Board of Elections by Oct 9 (addresses are on the form)

2- Register online and press "submit": www.votespa.com
Either way, your voter card should arrive in the mail within 2 weeks

Who is eligible?

All US citizens who will be at least 18 years old by 11/6/18 People with incarceration records or on parole ARE eligible in PA!

Who should RE-register?

Anyone who moved since they last voted, or who changed their name Anyone who has skipped several elections (re-register to be sure you are not taken off the rolls)

Other questions?



From our historical memory:

November 2000

We asked Las Anonas for a list of family members who died in the civil war, made and painted white crosses, and wrote the names of dead on the crosses. We planted the 121 crosses in St. Vincent's church yard for two weeks, and when Alberto Climaco and Vilma Ortiz visited, they marched with us at the School of the Americas in Fort Benning, Georgia, carrying the crosses with the names of the dead from Las Anonas. Faith and solidarity in action!

A Walk Through Las Anonas de Santa Cruz - August 2018

At the southernmost point in the community is the Ramos colony. Adán Ramos stayed with our community for a few weeks in winter of 2013 before going to stay with his aunt in Indianapolis. He returned home two years ago when his father, Porfirio, grew weak from kidney disease. His father is taking homeopathic medicine these days and is doing much better. Adán has settled back home with his partner Cindy and their daughter Genesis.



Carmen's sister, Gloria (in the hat, below) and co-worker are tending to the new cacao orchard. 744 plants grow in the shade of the cashew trees. The first crop is due in May of 2019.



Up the road a little ways was the family of another comrade suffering from kidney disease who did not fare as well. Carmen López Requeño died on June 12th. Her health was compromised since giving birth by caesarian section three years ago as her intestines were perforated. Carmen suffered much pain in the last month of her life; neighbors could hear her cries through the night. The community accompanied her and her family throughout this ordeal, arriving at all hours to be with them. Our brothers and sisters joined prayers and tears for Carmen with prayers and Brendan Browning Lafferty, son of Sharon Browning, who had visited Las Anonas in 2002, and who died suddenly on August 4th. We grieve in solidarity. Mari and Luis Alfonso to the right have hosted many from Philadelphia in recent years. They have new neighbors, the family of Reina and Toñio, who lived outside of the town but were given a plot of land within the community where they feel safer. Here, though, they only have a stick home with tin roof and no well. Mari called over one morning, "Desayunar?" "Breakfast?" She served her friend a plate and sent her home with sweetbread for everyone. Another morning Reina came with a pile of laundry and used the water, the pila, or deep sink, and the clothesline of her kind neighbors. "We will always remember," Alfonso explained, "that this community helped us when we came to them seeking land and a home in 1995. They welcomed us, and we do the same in return." 





Evelyn Francis Lee Rogers (Hawthorne) was born on

November 24, 1928 in Richmond, Virginia to the late William and Willnette Hawthorne. She went home with The Lord on September 10, 2018 after a brief illness.

Evelyn was educated in the Richmond Public School System, and went on to earn her B.A. in Social Work from Virginia Union University. After graduating, she enlisted in the United States Army in 1951, where she served as a teacher in the WAC (Women's Army Corps) for five years, attaining the rank of Sergeant First Class.

After being discharged from the Army, Evelyn moved, here, to Philadelphia, PA where she met Marion Rogers. They were married, and their union produced five children – Mark, Pam, Kevin, Kimberly and Craig, putting all five children through Catholic School. Evelyn later received her Master's Degree, plus 30, in Education from Antioch University: education was something that was very important to her.

Evelyn used all her training throughout her adult life in the service of others. She first served as a social worker, then as a counselor in the Philadelphia School District; and, after retirement, she offered her expertise to Catholic Social Services for a stipend of just \$50 a week.

In her role as the Parish Social Worker at St Vincent's, Evelyn created a successful GED Adult Education program, with volunteer teachers who were eager to assist. She also ran a thrift store and taught a nutrition class. She assisted many people in finding employment by partnering with various companies who contacted her for help.


One of the areas of service that brought her the greatest joy was the Food Cupboard at St. Vincent's. It was there that she, and a team of faithful volunteers, gave daily food assistance to the community and would distribute turkey baskets every Thanksgiving and Christmas for over 40 years! Annually, they were able to give away over 200 turkey baskets! She was so dedicated to this crucial neighborhood service that she was consistently working at the Food Cupboard 3 days a week up until her illness earlier his month. Evelyn also organized a network where local schools adopted families in need to receive gifts of clothing and toys every Christmas. She received food donations and financial support of several prominent organizations in the city of Philadelphia.

Evelyn enjoyed traveling the world, reading, teaching, and spending time with family and friends. She also adored her church and sharing her love of Christ. She and her husband were President and Vice President of the Home & School Association of St. Vincent's Hospitality Committee and made sure she was always present in school-related activities. Evelyn faithfully attended St. Vincent's services every Sunday throughout her life. She often counseled the community and was a long-time Eucharistic Minister. She was a member of St. Vincent's African-American History Group and had the special honor of being an Affiliate of the Congregation The Mission (Vincentians) because of her community service to the poor. She was also the recipient of the Aid Friends Rita Ungaro-Schiavone Award, given for Extraordinary Volunteer Service and Long Term Commitment to the Isolated, Frail, Elderly & Disabled Home Bound. And she was honored to receive an Apostolic Blessing from Pope John Paul II.

Evelyn was preceded in death by her husband Marion, son Mark, daughter Pamela, nephew Lynn Johnson, and brothers, Thomas Johnson and Nelson Johnson. After the passing of her beloved husband, Marion, she continued to face life with determination, strength, bravery and compassion. She continued to be a wonderful motivator, provider and nurturer to her family as well as model servant to her community and church.

Evelyn is survived by her daughter Kimberly, her sons Kevin and Craig (Ruthlande). Her grandchildren Sheena, Shanae (Scott), Markie, Erika, Gregory, Marquan, Alana and Julian. She was also blessed with five great-grandchildren, Craig, Jordyn, Joshua, Zion, and Jolie. Other beloved family members include her niece Barbara Ann, nephews, Nelson Jr. and Stanley, great nieces Deirdre, Denise and Dana, great nephew Daryl and a one adopted son Maurice.




