Today is the Day of days: Let us show Christ to the poor and hungry, so our service to them is a sign of his glory.

This is the day the Lord has made! Let all the earth cry out with joy, today is the Day of days! Bless this meal, O Lord, and grant everyone a place at the feast of heaven. Amen.

THE FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT IN REAL LIFE

Chances are, as a former Catholic school child you once had to be able to list all the fruits of the Spirit. If you've forgotten them, Pentecost offers a chance to revisit them in a new way.

In fact, in Galatians 5, Paul speaks of a single fruit of the Spirit, manifesting through nine facets—much like segments of an orange. When our life in the Spirit is fruitful, all the facets are visible, and indeed, they overlap again and again.

Take a few minutes to reflect on the working of the Holy Spirit in your life. Are all the "segments" of the fruit present?

Love:

To love is to desire good for others. Whom do I love? To whom do I wish evil, and how can I change that?

Joy and Peace:

Is my spirit at peace? Am I joy-filled, or am I often angry, anxious, or at odds with others and the world? Do I take time to be still in the presence of God, the source of all joy and peace?

Patience:

Do I persist in the tasks to which I am called, even in the face of resistance? Do I fly off the handle when others try my patience?

Kindness:

Am I focused outward, ready to lend a sympathetic ear? Do I listen with an open heart to those whose experiences are different from my own?

Generosity:

Do I give people the benefit of the doubt, or do I default to negative judgment? Do I make tithing and charity a priority, or do I allow my own wants to swallow my income?

Faithfulness:

Do I talk behind other people's backs? Do I criticize friends or family in my heart without sharing my concerns? Am I faithful to God? Do I let derogatory or hurtful comments to or about other children of God go unchallenged, out of fear of conflict or judgment?

Gentleness:

When the inevitable irritations of the day arise, do I roll with the punches? Do I approach conflict in a way that seeks the best interests of everyone involved? When I discipline those under my authority, do I take a punitive approach, or one that helps us all grow into holier, healthier individuals?

Self-control:

Self-discipline touches so many areas of life: expressing anger, word choices in online interactions, scheduling, food consumption, spending habits, screen time, the use of physical powers, time management. Am I intentionally under control in the way I navigate the world?

Holy Week: A Time to Honor & Heal the Relationship between Christians & Jews

Reflections from a Lector

In this holiest of seasons, we Christians are called to celebrate the love God showed for us by grafting us onto the "olive tree" of those first called into a sacred covenant relationship with God: the Jewish people (Romans 11).

It is hard for us to hear that our Christian faith has sometimes been twisted, through the centuries, to justify prejudice and violent attacks against Jews. It can be even harder for us to realize that parts of our own Scriptures--particularly some of the Passion narratives we read this week, and segments of the Book of Acts read during Easter season-- have been misinterpreted to support this kind of thinking and action by Christians against Jewish people and faith, even though Jesus himself and his first disciples were Jewish. **How can we heal this?**

* PRAYER

As St Paul reminds us in Romans, we are all the grateful recipients of God's boundless mercy. And "the gifts and the call of God are irrevocable" (Rom 11:29)

* LEARNING

There are many excellent resources. Two "quick reads" are available on the tables near the church entrance during Lent and Holy Week:

Nostra Aetate, a (In Our Time), a ground-breaking 1965 Vatican document that rejects the centuries-old accusation of "deicide" ("God-killing") that some Christians have leveled against Jews.

"Some Reflections on the Portrayal of Jews in the Lectionary for Holy Week," by Angela Russell Christman, a scripture scholar at Loyola University Maryland.

* LISTENING & INTERACTING

As we know from our own experience, we thrive whenever we see the face of God and hear the voice of God in each other. This is what Pope Francis calls "encounter," and it is what we were made for! Seek opportunities to get to know Jewish people. Find out about the Jewish faith It is a font of wisdom and strength that continues to glorify God's name. We are blessed to be sisters and brothers, all made in the divine image, all seeking to fill this world with God's love and justice. In Holy Week, and every week, let us remember this!

HOLY THURSDAY - FOOT WASHING by Dick Taylor

We stoop to wash each other's feet as Jesus did so long ago.

All is here towel, basin, soap willing hands and hearts, toe, arch and heel

and water.

Behold the mystery of this water.

Don't say, "I got it from the tap when I turned the faucet."

Behold the mystery of this water.

Behind the tap, pressure pushing copper pipes. Beyond the pipes, more tubes, the main, the network under streets humming, sloshing, rushing, purring.

All webbed to purification plants electronic sensors levers, gauges metered chemicals

And up the line, tunnels, vast valves, gates swinging open, sliding shut gulping from reservoir and river.

These drops that bathe our toes Where do they come from?

Not enough to speak of northern streams and springs, source of Schuylkill and Delaware.

Clouds! Raindrops! Haze! Morning fog caressing boulders Baking sun lifting moisture from Bahaman bays Sweet dew on Adirondack grasses Lightening, thunder, storms, shrieking wind sprinkle, spray, shower, splatter, flood, deluge a vast churning They travel the world.

Perhaps, perhaps this instep moisture once whipped from frenzied waves to tare at boats in Galvelston

or rested cold and frozen on Anapurna's height or splashed hot on elephant's back near Brazzaville.

How old, these drops that bathe our toes?

They do not die, as you and I. They raised Noah's ark.

THE FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT IN REAL LIFE

Chances are, as a former Catholic school child you once had to be able to list all the fruits of the Spirit. If you've forgotten them, Pentecost offers a chance to revisit them in a new way.

In fact, in Galatians 5, Paul speaks of a single fruit of the Spirit, manifesting through nine facets—much like segments of an orange. When our life in the Spirit is fruitful, all the facets are visible, and indeed, they overlap again and again.

Take a few minutes to reflect on the working of the Holy Spirit in your life. Are all the "segments" of the fruit present?

Love:

To love is to desire good for others. Whom do I love? To whom do I wish evil, and how can I change that?

Joy and Peace:

Is my spirit at peace? Am I joy-filled, or am I often angry, anxious, or at odds with others and the world? Do I take time to be still in the presence of God, the source of all joy and peace?

Patience:

Do I persist in the tasks to which I am called, even in the face of resistance? Do I fly off the handle when others try my patience?

Kindness:

Am I focused outward, ready to lend a sympathetic ear? Do I listen with an open heart to those whose experiences are different from my own?

Generosity:

Do I give people the benefit of the doubt, or do I default to negative judgment? Do I make tithing and charity a priority, or do I allow my own wants to swallow my income?

Faithfulness:

Do I talk behind other people's backs? Do I criticize friends or family in my heart without sharing my concerns? Am I faithful to God? Do I let derogatory or hurtful comments to or about other children of God go unchallenged, out of fear of conflict or judgment?

Gentleness:

When the inevitable irritations of the day arise, do I roll with the punches? Do I approach conflict in a way that seeks the best interests of everyone involved? When I discipline those under my authority, do I take a punitive approach, or one that helps us all grow into holier, healthier individuals?

Self-control:

Self-discipline touches so many areas of life: expressing anger, word choices in online interactions, scheduling, food consumption, spending habits, screen time, the use of physical powers, time management. Am I intentionally under control in the way I navigate the world?

Holy Week: A Time to Honor & Heal the Relationship between Christians & Jews

Reflections from a Lector

In this holiest of seasons, we Christians are called to celebrate the love God showed for us by grafting us onto the "olive tree" of those first called into a sacred covenant relationship with God: the Jewish people (Romans 11).

It is hard for us to hear that our Christian faith has sometimes been twisted, through the centuries, to justify prejudice and violent attacks against Jews. It can be even harder for us to realize that parts of our own Scriptures--particularly some of the Passion narratives we read this week, and segments of the Book of Acts read during Easter season-- have been misinterpreted to support this kind of thinking and action by Christians against Jewish people and faith, even though Jesus himself and his first disciples were Jewish. **How can we heal this?**

* LEARNING

* LISTENING & INTERACTING

As we know from our own experience, we thrive whenever we see the face of God and hear the voice of God in each other. This is what Pope Francis calls "encounter," and it is what we were made for! Seek opportunities to get to know Jewish people. Find out about the Jewish faith It is a font of wisdom and strength that continues to glorify God's name.
